### Watch Annie Live This Weekend!

How long has it been since you've seen live theatre?! This weekend, enjoy a performance of *Annie*, our "winter" musical, live on the SAS YouTube channel—watch at 8 PM ET on Saturday, March 27 here, or watch at 2 PM ET on Sunday, March 28 here. Students and faculty rehearsed *Annie* over Zoom (!) throughout our virtual winter term, and will perform it live in Engelhard this weekend before a physically distanced audience of students. The production is a one-act version of the musical and lasts approximately one hour. "Many seniors in this production have been devoted to the theatre program since they first arrived on campus," notes Theatre Program Director Ann Taylor. "We could have taken the easier road and simply cancelled the musical this year, but somehow, that just

did not seem right. And the production nearly went up in flames when a crucial member of the cast was initially on the recent quarantine list. As with all things these days, nothing is a certainty and all plans can change in moments. Please cross your fingers for these kids!" # It All Begins in the Classroom...

AS Bio students discuss evolution with Mr. O'Connell.







English 1 students are currently reading *Macbeth*. "These students are doing incredible work," said their teacher Ms. Reddy. "We were discussing Macbeth's internal conflict and his feelings about possibly murdering King Duncan."









Chemistry students work on a "drop titration using the neutralization reaction between NaOH and HCl," explains teacher Mr. Rehrig. "Students had to find the volume—the number of drops—of NaOH required to neutralize 20 drops of HCl, and then use that information—along with the known volume and concentration of the HCl—to calculate the concentration of the NaOH solution."









Crawford Seeley '22 and Flynn Bowman '22 work through an exhibition with Ms. Hastings on Banana Yoshimoto's novella *Kitchen*. "The story's narrator is Mikage, a young woman who faces immense grief and loss, but who comes to understand—with the help of a very strong older woman, Eriko—that joy can only be experienced and understood if you have encountered true despair," says Ms. Hastings.







In Ms. Pressman's AS Histories of Hate class, students discuss newspaper articles covering the bubonic plague outbreak on the West Coast and in Hawai'i at the turn of the 20th century—"which many blamed on Chinese- and Japanese-Americans, with violent and dangerous results," notes Ms. Pressman. "We've been studying the the longer history of racism against the Asian, Asian-American, and Pacific Islander communities in the U.S.— and how it has been particularly linked to and spurred by fear of disease."





In AS Differential Calculus, "students were deriving Pascal's triangle by finding the number of ways a bug could reach a point three units to the right and two units up after five seconds, if the bug can only jump one unit to the right or one unit up each second," explains teacher Mr. Finch. "I encourage readers to find it themselves!"













# Go Saints!


